2003 Spring Lecture Series is in Full Swing

Our 2003 Spring Lecture Series is on a roll!

The Gazebo Room, Lombardo's, Harry's, the Alva, the Subway Café – all conjure images of the days when relatives by blood and marriage ran many of restaurants catering to Harrisburg's business and political communities. Most are gone, at least in name, but their legends gain in stature as today's restaurant renaissance recalls the glory days of dining out. Historic Harrisburg Association celebrates the restaurant revival and anticipates *Dine Downtown* – its own annual night out – with “**Historic Restaurants of Harrisburg**,” the presentation for the **Monday, April 28, 2003** monthly membership meeting. **HHA Board Member, Diane McCormick**, shares tales from

the dining rooms and kitchens of the restaurants that live in memory and those that remain in the city's social scene. Combining reminiscences from restaurant owners whose names are now legendary – Gekas, Giusti, Kaldes – with historical research and photos, she will review the days of cocktail lounges and upholstered booths. From the weeks after Hurricane Agnes when the Subway Café advertised that, like the Leaning Tower of Pisa, the restaurant, leaned but didn't fall, to the Gazebo Room's venture into distributing its trademark salad dressing by filling empty liquor bottles. Ms. McCormick will present the devotion, spunk, and hospitality that characterized the great restaurateurs of another era.

HHA 30th Anniversary Flashback – 1979-1983

Second in a series of articles tracing the 30 Year history of the Historic Harrisburg Association

As Historic Harrisburg Association entered 1979 there was little time to rest on the past five years achievements. That April, hard on the heels of the loss of the Telegraph Building, demolition of the five-story Donaldson Apartments at 204 North Second Street for a private parking garage, dealt yet another blow to the preservation cause. The Donaldson was a savable building. Erected in 1905, its concept of multi-unit living was the first of its kind for the city.

If in every organization there must be peaks as well as valleys, Historic Harrisburg found itself down in the hollow. Its popular event, the annual Candlelight House Tour, was abandoned when its busy volunteer core ran into difficulty. Responsibility for the 1979 event was taken over by an impromptu committee of previous year participants.

HHA made up for the inconvenience by hosting an experimental House & Garden Tour in May of 1980. A decade later it would be revived to become an annual event.

The newsletter too, fell on hard times. Following Jeb Stuart's departure as editor at the end of 1978, *Harrisburg Heritage* had to be regrettably scaled back from 10 to 4 issues a year. Judy Dugan, the new editor, couldn't continue, and during 1980 publication was suspended altogether with 3 issues of "News Notes" mailed out the 200-plus members.

Despite 1979's dismal beginning, Historic Harrisburg's message of preserving the integrity of neighborhood and landmark architecture was far from being unheard. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania aborted plans to demolish what is now the old Fox Ridge neighborhood for further Capitol Complex expansion. Future office growth was henceforth concentrated in the central business district and as a result both the Barto (originally the Masonic Temple) and State Street Buildings were rehabilitated.

By 1980, the state was also funding the Downtown Harrisburg Preservation Project. Jeb Stuart was hired as project director and

sole staff member. A number of important buildings were identified and listed on the National Register of Historic Places and creative ways found to stimulate their rehabilitation. The Kunkel Building at Third and Market streets was targeted in this way and today functions as an arts tower with its lower levels given over to the Susquehanna Art Museum.



Succeeding Arnold Kogan as president in the spring of 1980 was James Mummert who also chaired the seminal House & Garden Tour. Jim unfortunately was unable to complete his presidency and vice president Rosanne McGee stepped forward to complete his term as well as being later elected president in her own right for 1981-82 and for 1982-83.

Harrisburg Heritage returned in January of 1981 sporting a fresh new look courtesy of designer Susan Hearn and edited by past president Harry R. Courtright. It was published for the first time in its present bi-monthly format. The Association was reinventing itself in other ways also. It had its first revolving fund project in 112 Conoy St. that HHA rehabilitated and sold at a profit after purchasing the dilapidated property from the Redevelopment Authority.

The election of HHA charter member Steve Reed as mayor of Harrisburg in November of 1981 put a friend of preservation in city hall. Milton, PA's Thomas R. Dean Associates was hired by the city to undertake the first-ever, comprehensive citywide historic resource survey and several potential historic districts were identified and created years later.

The members met for the final time that November in Room G-24 at the State Museum, space where many a plan was hatched, lifelong friendships made and the future of long-neglected buildings decided. HHA began 1982 by moving into a new "home" at the Harrisburg Civic Club at Front and North streets.

The early '80s also were a time of branching out for the Association. Bus trips were organized to New Market and Frederick, Maryland and to Lancaster's historic district. Co-founder Frank Pines put together a fine trip to Philadelphia's Society Hill. In a joint effort with the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Association of University Women, HHA published its first walking tour guide booklet, "Harrisburg – A Walk Through History."

Upon Harry Courtright's exit from the newsletter, editors Ted Hanson, Grant Mallett and Monica O'Reily along with a host of writers kept the information flowing. Thus far it had been quite a ride from that spirited little group of ten years before

A cadre of committed preservationists with a vision to spread, a lot of heart and not much more than determination to egg them on.

With PA Historical & Museum Commission Executive Director Dr. Larry E. Tice as guest speaker, Historic Harrisburg celebrated its 10th anniversary on February 28, 1983 at the Civic Club. That spring, Hubert Peterson was elected president and the Association pushed on into its second decade and all the future would hold.

I am writing to you as a longtime board member of the Historic Harrisburg Association. We are delighted by the excellent restoration work your committee has accomplished.

Having visited at least ten state capitols in the United States, I have become aware that the "built" environment surrounding these capitols is almost as important as the buildings in conveying an impression of the quality of the state.

We, at the Historic Harrisburg Association, have fought several battles over the years to insure that our capitol building is not diminished by tall, or inappropriate, buildings in the immediate vicinity of the capitol building itself.

A current example is the new Belco Credit Union expansion building proposed for the corner of Second and State Streets, which will require extensive demolition of older buildings. The new building will become part of the fabric of the State Street Mall leading to the Capitol steps.

We wish to know if your committee has any interest in following and commenting on various proposed new projects relating to perception of the capitol building.

Dear Mr. Cameron,

Thank you for your kind comments regarding the Capitol Preservation Committee's restoration work. I share your concern for preserving the "built" environment around the Capitol Building.

It has been most unfortunate that tall buildings have obscured the beauty of the Capitol from the rest of the cityscape as many people look for the dome in the horizon to find their way to the Capitol. Please send us any copies of correspondence or sketches that you obtain that you wish to share.

In the vicinity of the Capitol, it is our hope to see new construction remain at the scale of historic buildings within the neighborhood. Taller buildings should be built down in the area near the Rachel Carson structure and not up in the Capitol's vicinity.

While we prefer to retain all sound historic structures, we also understand that some structures have been neglected for so long that they have become unstable. New structures, if required, can be designed with sensitivity to its existing neighbors, so that everyone will be the beneficiary.

Please continue to keep us informed on this issue. We wish you success as you strive to save our cityscapes and people friendly neighborhoods.

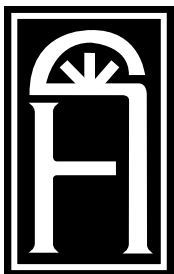

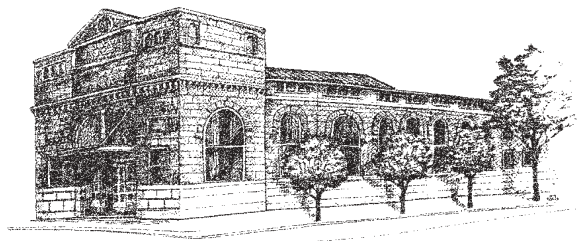
