## 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Candlelight House Tour Planned for December 14<sup>th</sup>

Between the gossamer of snowflakes, frosted trees, and lights twinkling like stars almost everywhere — you may feel like you're in the most romantic place on earth! This is the atmosphere that characterizes Historic Harrisburg Association's signature event: The Candlelight House Tour. Plans are well underway for HHA's 30<sup>th</sup> Annual Candlelight House Tour to take place on Sunday, December 14<sup>th</sup> from 1:00-6:00 p.m. This year, the tour, *Harrisburg Homecoming: The 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Candlelight Tour* will feature homes from across the face of Harrisburg including Shipoke, Capitol area, Midtown, and Uptown.

This year's event is being chaired by Melissa Snyder, a resident of Shipoke, and an active member of HHA. Her husband, Michael Snyder, is also a member of the local Historic Architectural Review Board. The Selection Committee has been chaired by long-time HHA member, Charles Peguese. Mr. Peguese is particularly excited about this year's tour roster since the committee has been able to approach several homeowners who have demonstrated a unique approach to restoration and/or décor. Focusing on different areas of the city will also provide a sense of variety for this eagerly awaited holiday event. Included on the tour will, of

course, be the Governor's Mansion, which will feature a gingerbread house built by students in the culinary program of Harrisburg Area Community College.

Tickets for the self-guided tour will be \$12.00 (advance) and \$15.00 (day of event) and will be available for advance purchase after November 20<sup>th</sup> at HHA's Historic Harrisburg Resource Center, 1230 North Third Street, Harrisburg. 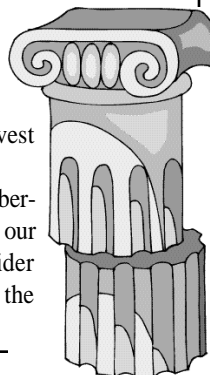

It was designed and built by Stephen Hills, the architect of the first Pennsylvania Capitol Building and served as the executive mansion for Governor Andrew Shulze from 1823-1829.

The current owners purchased the building in 1982 and undertook a thorough restoration that has brought it to its present state. This award-winning restoration features the front vestibule, vaulted ceilings, an oval staircase, and marble fireplaces. It will provide a striking venue for a harvest celebration of thanks to our best and most loyal supporters.

# THE DIRECTOR'S CHAIR

As you read in the President's comments on page 2, there has been an important change at HHA. I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to HHA's members and supporters.

I am a new addition to the Harrisburg family. I have been a native and long-time resident of Buffalo, NY, and, as such, am no stranger to the need for a balanced and intelligent approach to the preservation of our historic architectural and cultural heritage. Buffalo, although a few decades younger than Harrisburg, was blessed with great economic prosperity during a time when Ameri-

can architecture blended science and art in a way not seen for quite some time since. Public and private buildings provide a landscape that tells the history of an industrious society, ever mindful of the future, but willing to pay homage to the past. Churches, homes, commercial and government buildings enshrine the history of settlers, later immigrants, and new citizens.

Like most cities, however, the advent of post-World War II war "progress" served to undermine many historical treasures like the urban park system laid out by Frederick Law Olmstead. Historic homes and buildings were razed in the name of progress and were replaced by "cookie-cutter" buildings devoid of the character and beauty of what preceded them. About the same time that Hurricane Agnes raised havoc with communities along the Susquehanna, many communities, including Buffalo, became increasingly aware of the need to preserve what was genuinely part of our collective story. The resulting preservation movement of the 1970's has not only been able to save many historically important buildings, but has matured into a network local organizations, like HHA, that are a vehicle for "smart" re-development of Buffalo's urban streetscapes.

I am proud and honored to have been selected to assist HHA in this work. I look forward to working with this important organization during my tenure as executive director.

## A Farewell from Penny Poerksen

# October Monthly Meeting Heard Regional Director of the National Trust

Andrew Scott Fine, Regional Director for the Northeast Field Office of the National Trust for Historic Preservation addressed the members of Historic Harrisburg Association and other interested participants at their monthly meeting, Monday, October 27, 2003. The presentation and follow-up panel discussion will take place at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Room of the Historic Harrisburg Resource Center, 1230 North Third Street, Harrisburg, PA. The Resource Center is located across from the historic Broad Street Market in the Midtown section of Harrisburg.

As Director for the Northeast Field Office of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Mr. Fine coordinates the National Trust programs and advocacy efforts of the office in Philadelphia, serving the states of Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Through the National Trust's network of regional and field offices, the organization works to build an organized and strong preservation movement and save historic places. The National Trust provides technical assistance, advice, funding and support to assist local and statewide preservation efforts.

Prior to joining the National Trust in 2000, Mr. Fine was with Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, the nation's largest statewide private nonprofit preservation organization. He coordinated the Circuit Rider program in northern Indiana providing direct services to local government planning and preservation programs. As coordinator for the Indiana Alliance of Historic District

Commissions, he provided training for the state's preservation commissions and successfully worked to adopt new state enabling legislation for historic preservation. He graduated from Ball State University in 1992 with degrees in Urban Planning and Development, and Environmental Design and Historic Preservation.

## Schenck Addresses Messiah Students

September 16, 2003. Margaret (Peggy) Schenck, Co-Vice-president for Education, recently spoke to the Resident History Club, a group consisting of senior history majors from Messiah College now living in the newly renovated Messiah Townhouses and Apartments on North and Liberty Streets. Roughly a dozen students heard about historic preservation particularly as it relates to the Harrisburg area.

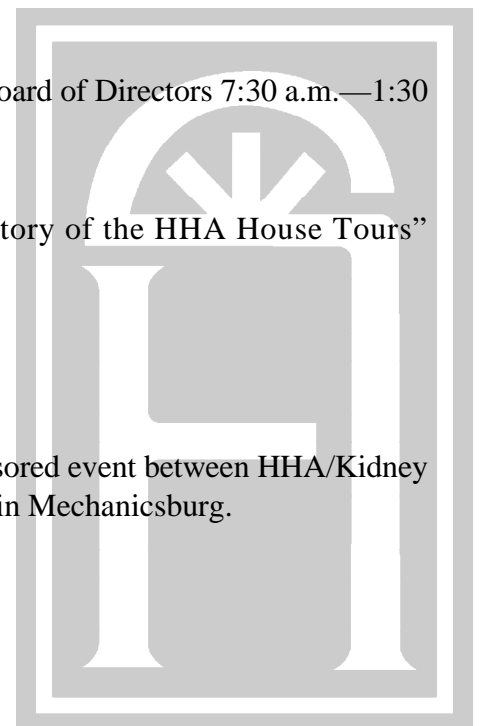
"The complex in which the students reside provides a living laboratory for preservation issues as it undergoes continuing restoration," stated Schenck. The Messiah Townhouses and Apartments is the most recent success story of historic preservation, evolving from a lengthy effort by local residents and preservationists to prevent demolition of existing buildings and the construction of a high rise parking garage in one of the city's historic districts. It provides students with an opportunity to experience firsthand the nature of urban living. HHA is grateful to the students and organizer, Joe Hackman, for the offer to hear about the work of the Historic Harrisburg Association.

# HHA 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Flashback – 1989-1993

*Fourth in a series of articles tracing the 30 Year history of the Historic Harrisburg Association*

Capping preservation's most productive decade yet, the Old Uptown Historic District is designated both a municipal and National Register Historic District in 1990. Rich in Queen Anne and Italianate detail, it encompasses housing between N. Second, Maclay, Reily and N. Third streets and is largely the work of Benjamin H. Engle, developer, builder and namesake to the century-old neighborhood.

Developmental pressures on historic buildings continues however in the central business district, which sees three of its most venerated works, the Peanut House (ca.1804) at Second and Chestnut, the Warner Hotel (ca.1814) at Second and Strawberry, and the Telegram Building (1888) at 227 Walnut, destroyed for new construction or parking purposes.

Gains are made as Harrisburg City Council votes to deny a request to demolish 213-17 Pine St. On a state level, Senate Bill 1228 that would have exempted churches from local historic district ordinances dies in committee following collective protest from preservation organizations.

*Historic Harrisburg continues to refine and expand upon its preservation mission.*

*As 1989 fades the membership continues to meet in its new headquarters at John Harris Mansion. Newsletter editor Rogan Brown redesigns the masthead into its present format but steps down from Harrisburg Heritage. Editorship over the next four years passes from Jackie Broadley to Cynthia Carmickle to Betty Holmboe to David Morrison.*

A new HHA logo appears, designed by Harrisburg Area Community College



graphic design student, Nancy Bair. The logo is used for the first time on the 1990 Historic Preservation Awards Ceremony program. Award winners include the turn-of-century Union Trust Co. Building on N. Market Sq., the city's first all steel-frame, curtain wall constructed midrise, as well as the beloved, but regrettably doomed, Peanut House.

The presidency passes from Tom Leonard in 1988 to David Morrison in 1989-91. Leonard reprises the role in 1992 and Paul Blust, Jr. is elected for 1993. HHA also hires its first Executive Director in David Morrison.

HHA joins in efforts to save the Star Barn in Lower Swatara Township as well as co-sponsors the first annual Elegant Progressions dinner in conjunction with the Kidney Foundation of Central PA. But as 1993 dawns the really big news is the donation by PA National Bank of their century-old Central Trust Co. Building at Third and Verbeke streets.

It has taken 20 years, but HHA finally has a home.

## Gallery Walk A Success

The 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Gallery Walk took place on Sunday, September 14. Twenty-six galleries participated including the Historic Harrisburg Resource Center. New to the self-guided tour of the city's downtown exhibition sites were St. Stephen's Episcopal School, the Design Museum at Fathom, Mangia Qui, Bridges Gallery, Ted L. Canady Old & Rare Books, Midtown Scholar Bookstore, Midtown Cinema, and Riverside Framing and Art Gallery.

The Historic Harrisburg Resource Center provided the venue for a photography and mixed media exhibit by Michelle Dauberman. Michelle describes her work as being about composition, natural light and detail. Her works tend to be "strong and angular" while paying close attention to direction and motion. She says, "I like to engage the viewer's eye through composition and then draw them to the purposeful details within the piece. Upon first glance these details are unnoticeable, however, should one take the time to study my pieces the details become quite obvious. These details can be textual, figurative or esoteric."

Michelle is owner and graphic designer at Bridges & Skyscrapers, a local graphic design company. She also runs the ArtsNetwork of Harrisburg, a non-profit/volunteer organization focused on keeping talented artists in the Greater Harrisburg area.

Michelle has received many awards for her work. She has been recognized by the Guggenheim's Susan Cross and has exhibited locally at several venues. Michelle's work will continue on exhibit at the Historic Harrisburg Resource Center until October 29<sup>th</sup>.

## Art Association Announces Five-Artist Exhibition

The Art Association of Harrisburg, an Allied Arts Fund Affiliate, has announced a Five-Artist Exhibition to be held October 25-November 26. 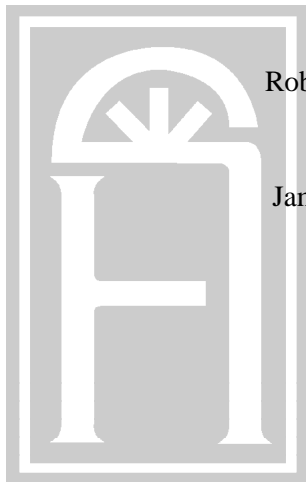

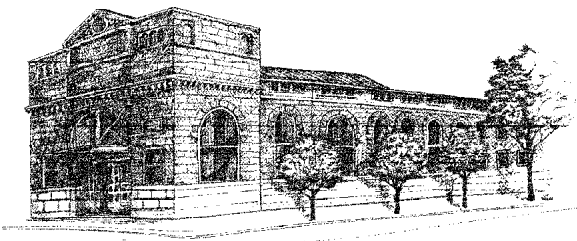
